## **4. Net**

The net stretches across the middle of the court and stands 3 feet (0.914 meters) high at the center. The net's height gradually rises to 3.5 feet (1.07 meters) at the posts, which are positioned just outside the singles sidelines. The net separates the two players or teams and plays a central role in dividing the court during rallies.

## **5. The Center Line**

Running perpendicular to the net, the center line divides the service boxes into two equal halves. The center line is vital during serving, as the server must serve the ball to the correct side of the opponent's service box, based on whether it is an even or odd game.
